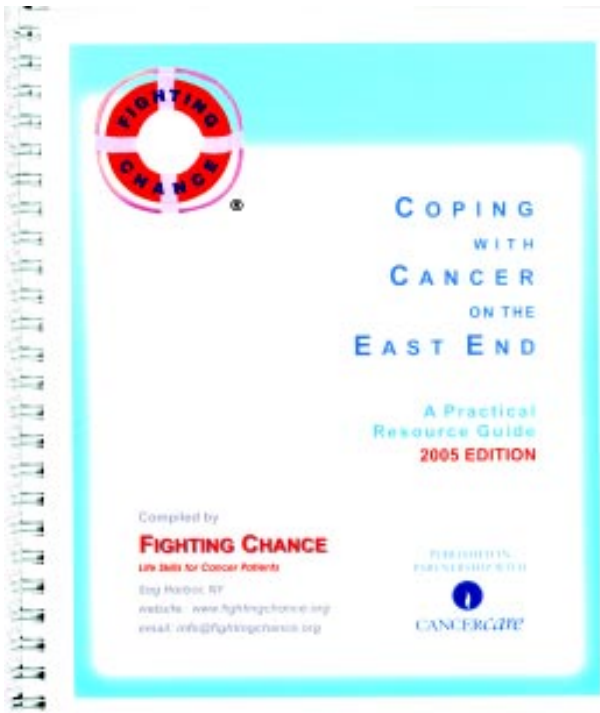

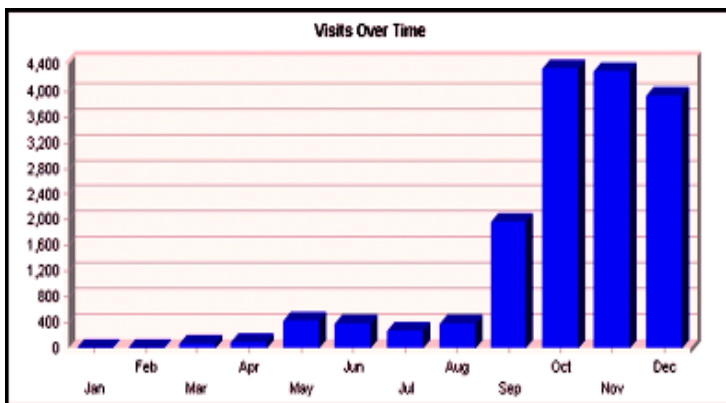

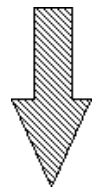

CHAPTER 1
DOCTORS

Dealing with cancer means dealing with doctors, often as part of your life journey, is crucial for right people to be on your medical team. To include as part of your life journey, is crucial for both your mental and physical health.

Challenge: How do I find the right doctor to treat me?

Solution: If you are reading this guide most likely you or your loved one has already diagnosed with cancer. In many cases a primary care physician and/or a generalist or women cancer and then refer patients to an oncologist for treatment.

The focus in this guide is on doctors who provide treatment of cancer. Doctor often provide treatment of cancer are surgeons, medical oncologists, and radiation oncologists may follow the treatment using Cat Scans, MRI, Bone Scan or PET.

The three most common forms of treatment for cancer are surgery, chemical therapy, and radiation therapy.

Surgery involves removing cancerous tissue from the body.

Chemotherapy is the use of a chemical agent to attack and kill cancer cells in additional intravenously and orally and can be used in doctor's office settings.

Radiation therapy is the use of high dose x-rays to kill cancer cells. Radiation therapy is given on an outpatient basis in hospital or radiation therapy center.

Selecting a doctor
As you begin your search for a doctor be sure to check his or her credentials. A doctor should be Board Certified. If a doctor is not Board Certified, it means that the doctor has not completed the most rigorous training and certification in his or her field.

Chapter Four: Hospitals & Health Care Clinics

TIP #31 ... Southampton Hospital Affiliation With New York Presbyterian HealthCare System: What It Could Mean for Cancer Care on the East End.

On January 1, 2015, Southampton Hospital became affiliated with the New York Presbyterian HealthCare System, a federation of some 30 top quality hospitals in the tri-state area. One of the hospitals in the system is Columbia Presbyterian Hospital in Manhattan, and its associated medical school, the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Columbia University — often known as just "P&S."

One of the "cornerstones" of the P&S facility, on the upper west side of Manhattan, is the Herbert Irving Comprehensive Cancer Center. A "CCC" designation from the National Cancer Institute signifies the highest standards in cancer research and cancer care (or simply, better to Tip #31).

Cancer patients on the East End of Long Island, who receive their primary care physicians at Southampton Hospital, may now be able to obtain "second opinion" prior surgery and access to cutting edge clinical trials via the new cancer/CCC at Columbia's medical facilities.

TRANSPORTATION

Coping with cancer means coping with an infinite number of doctor appointments. Being able to get around is vital.

Challenge: How can I find the transportation I need to get to and from all of my doctor's appointments?

Solution: The first step in planning your transportation needs is assessing your resources. Your transportation options will typically fall into one of three categories: self-driving, public and private. Taking a transportation plan to your needs may involve driver's license, a combination of all three. Having cancer often means taking a lot of drugs. Some of these drugs will be administered in the hospital or at the doctor's office, but many will be prescribed for you by your doctor through a pharmacy.

Challenge: How do I select a pharmacy that is convenient, that will help reduce my confusion and keep my costs to a minimum?

Solution: You or your loved one may be spending a significant amount of time at the pharmacy picking up prescriptions, so it's important you feel comfortable with the pharmacy you choose. Here are some helpful questions to think about as you select a pharmacy:

- Is this pharmacy in a convenient location for me or my loved one?
- Can I have my doctor call in prescriptions to save time?
- Is the pharmacist available to answer my questions?
- Does this pharmacy accept my insurance?
- Does this pharmacy deliver?

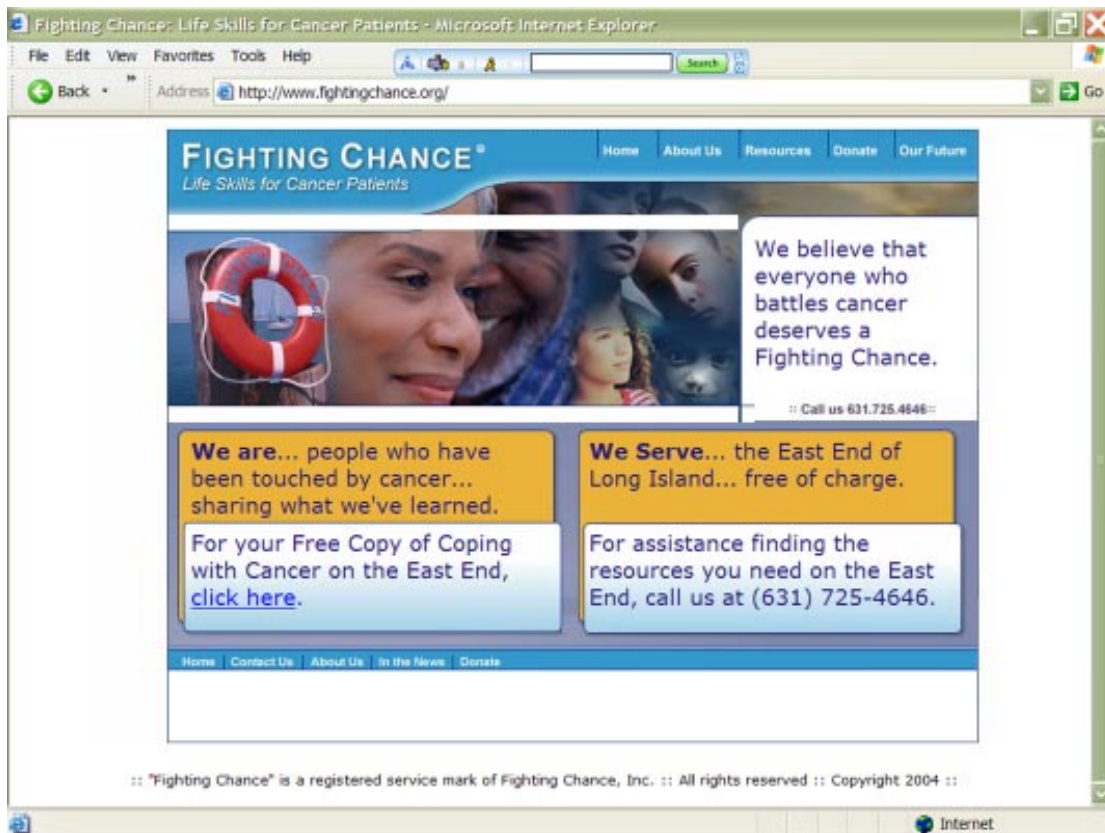

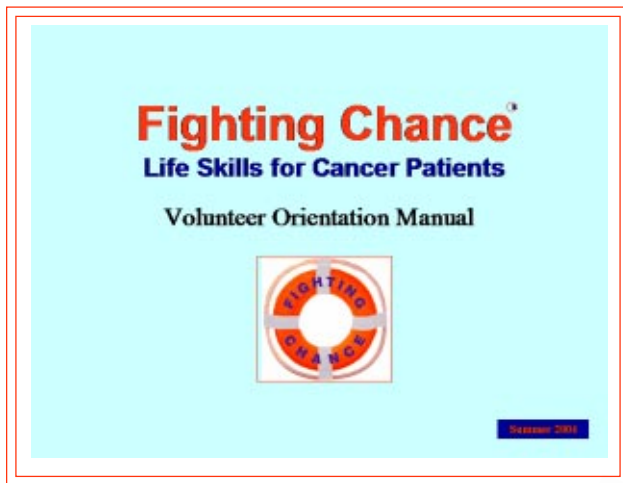

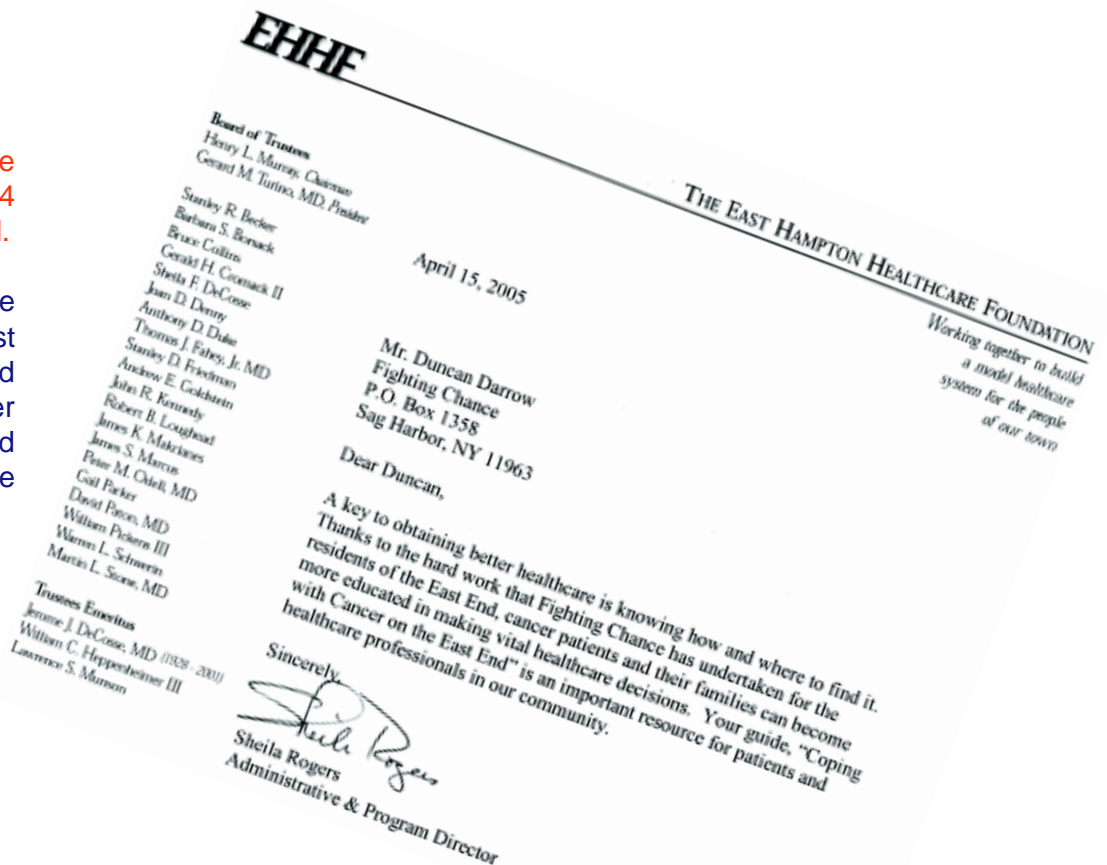
From one of our volunteers . . .

FIGHTING CHANCE

Organization Is a Life Saver

One year after opening, help thousands cope with cancer

It is exactly one year since "Fighting Chance" opened up its office in a little alley off Main Street, Sag Harbor. Since then the charity, which is committed to providing support and information for cancer patients and caregivers, has grown remarkably.

The charity's story actually begins two years ago, in 2003, when Fighting Chance first came into existence. The first twelve months were spent preparing what Duncan Darrow, Fighting Chance's Chairman, describes as "a yellow pages for cancer care." This guide, "Coping with Cancer on the East End" is the focal point of Fighting Chance's efforts to provide support for cancer sufferers in the local community. Compiled with the help of members of the medical profession, it provides patients and caregivers with the necessary tools to find answers to all kinds of questions concerning cancer and the practical difficulties that are involved in its treatment.

The guide has two key benefits for East End residents. Firstly, it is regionally focused which means that patients can find local information, and secondly, it is interactive, allowing patients to get in contact with the necessary support providers listed in the guide.

In its first edition the guide contained fifty pages, but

its new updated version runs to over seventy-five and it is now available in an increased number of doctor's offices, as well as through Fighting Chance's website (www.fightingchance.org). The charity hopes to have the document available in as many waiting rooms and offices as possible, so that they can offer help from the minute of diagnosis onwards.

"Fighting Chance realizes how important it is to have bridges with the medical community," says Darrow, and to this end, a Medical Advisory Committee has been set up with doctors and administrators from hospitals such as Southampton, Riverhead and Memorial Sloan Kettering. Janine Veto, Deputy Director of Fighting Chance says, "it's our job to build up doctor confidence in Fighting Chance, so they see our guide really can be a helpful part of patient counseling." Kerri Zampini Robinson has also come on board. Formerly Director of Post-Treatment at Memorial Sloan Kettering, Robinson offers a unique insight as an oncological social worker and will be a liaison with the Medical Advisory Committee. She praises the guide saying that, "it gives them [cancer patients and caregivers] what they need. It is relevant and informative."

Over the past year, Fighting Chance has seen its website "explode," now receiving over 4,000 hits every month.

Further evidence of the charity's success is provided by their recent partnership with Cancer Care, a national non-profit that provides free, professional services to people with cancer. The two organizations have co-published the new edition of the guide but Darrow says that there is more to the collaboration - "Cancer Care is a national organization. If we have a caller with a significant level of stress we can now refer them to Cancer Care to ensure that they receive the help they need."

"We're working with cancer patients at the grass roots level in Suffolk County," he said. "We know a lot about local resources because we sort of 'wrote the book' on that. So, out here, we can really help cancer patients map out the support system they need to improve their chances of survival."


INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT
